rock placed over a fabric mat is a great start. As we drive on it this winter the material will compact creating a solid foundation. Once ready, a second layer of smaller crushed rock will be applied to smooth it out. I am working with our landlord to minimize the number of gates required along this route. In the meantime please remember to always close the first 3 gates as you enter from FBR. The gate into the flying field should remain open with the north section secured to the post at the ditch. This allows our landlord to use the large field without her horses accessing the field east of the runway.

However, she did approve of the gate being moved in a bit.

Arleen has said that she will not keep the horses in the intermediate field area on high use days. The long term plan is to have a new fence between the FBR gate and gate two.


Flying January 1, 2013





Safety Corner

Here we are at beginning of another year. We didn't come out unscathed last year since one of our members managed to get his hand into the prop arc. The good news is he is healed and back flying. Let's stride for zero incidents this year.

Keep in mind, in the winter we wear heavier clothes and for the most part, loose fitting coats with bulky sleeves. Be careful around the propeller. Most of the time all that happens is an embarrassing hole in the coat, but it can be much worse. If you are that close to the prop, you had better rethink how you are doing things.

What do you do with your used Xacto blades? Ken Mowrey suggest pharmacies have containers for sharps that you can buy. When it is full you take it back and they will dispose of them properly.

I know that I have hit on this subject before, not that I'm picking on the electric guys, (well maybe a little). When you are ready to connect the battery and arm the system, make sure your plane is secure, and you're following all the Cautions, Dangers and other Warnings that the manufacturer has detailed in the operators manual that came with the ESC. The ESCs I have, you turn on the Transmitter before connecting the battery, then put the Throttle lever to high speed and then back to low speed and the thing will beep a couple times indicating the controller is armed. When you next advance the throttle, the motor will run. Remember you can inadvertently move the throttle lever by other means. The important thing to remember: Make sure the prop is clear, no one is in the plane of the propeller and the model is secured from moving forward or backwards. (With a brushless motor switching any two of the motor wires will cause the motor to run in reverse). And of course, Think about what you are doing. In this respect Electrics are more dangerous than the in-

ternal combustion engines. Also, when you land, disconnect the battery before turning off the transmitter.

One of the things I do when setting up an electric plane is either I don't connect the motor until I have all the servos installed and set the way I want them or remove the propeller until I am sure that all is working properly.

Speaking of propeller planes there are many other things we use that are a rotating mass. Like the cut-off wheels we use on the Dremel tools. Stay out of the rotational plane of these also. They are very easily shattered as anyone that uses them knows. Better to use the reinforced type although they do cut a wider kerf, require more power and generate more heat. When you are grinding and cutting wear safety glasses with side shields.

Let's keep it safe this year.

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






Our club is dedicated to the safe pursuit and advancement of model aviation. We offer the newcomer free lessons to learn how to build models and to fly them. If you should have any questions about the club, flight instruction or membership requirements, call any of the club officers. We have a safety checklist available for those new to our flying field.

Use of a computer simulator is advisable. This allows you to practice safely and will end up saving you hundreds of dollars in the long run.

Still, in any case, the best way to learn to fly R/C planes is by finding an instructor to help. Learning on your own can be expensive and somewhat less safe.

We provide instruction for both building model aircraft as well as flying these models. In most cases, a buddy box system is used at the flying field. Experience has shown this to be the safest method to learn.
