

Safety Corner

Some of the Safety Corner for is month I plagiarized from the Battery Charging Guide-lines, some Rick Hanners wrote to be handed out at the February general meeting.

Take a moment to think about all the devises that use lithium chemistry as a power source that you use on a daily basis, like your beloved cell phone, I Pod, laptop computer and on and on. We charge these devices sitting on wood tables and all sorts of flammable surfaces and in flammable areas of our homes and offices without a thought of the consequences. When you come out to the field and need to charge your Lipo battery pack you are looked upon as the village idiot if you throw your little airplane in the car and connect the XYZ super charger to the Lipo battery while the airplane is on the front seat. Even better when you walk away to BS with friends. So why is it that we can plug our cell phone or laptop into the power outlet and nobody thinks anything of it?

The answer is simple. Each one of these devices has the battery pack as a proprietary unit custom fit to the device. The charger connectors are proprietary to the device as is the charger that you plug into the wall outlet or the power outlet in your car. The charger itself is matched to the battery chemistry designed into the device. The charger has been designed for the device with designed in failsafe features and there is nothing that the user can adjust or screw up, within reason. With that I'll turn it over to Rick for more details.

One of these concerns we have today involves the proper charging of Lithium batteries. As more members of the club step into the world of electric powered flight, the proper safe charging of Lithium Flight Batteries at the field has become more of a concern. So the club is issuing some **common sense guidelines** to increase the club member's awareness of how they can make field charging a safer practice for themselves while minimizing the possibility of personal injury and/or property damage:

1. If the charger you are using is capable of charging batteries of different chemistries (Lithium, Nickel, lead acid), make sure the charger is set for the proper chemistry BEFORE

starting to charge a battery.

- 2. If possible, use a standalone battery as the power source for the charger.
- 3. If you have to use the battery in your vehicle as the power source for the charger, locate the charger and the battery being charged, **OUTSIDE** your vehicle. Do not locate the charger/battery inside your vehicle or under the hood of your vehicle.
- 4. Place the battery being charged within a fire resistant container, such as a LipoSack, Battery Bunker or similar container. (VB) If you don't have a container set the battery on a non-flammable surface with a lot of non-flammable space around it. An example would be outside on the concrete side walk.
- 5. Remove the battery from your r/c model in order to charge it.
- 6. When the battery charge is started **VER-IFY** that the charger is set for the proper number of cells and charge rate. **Failure to do so is one of the main causes of battery fires.**
- 7. Never charge the battery unattended. When charging the battery you should constantly monitor the charging process so you can react to potential problems that might occur. (VB) in my opinion this should have been the very first item.
- 8. Cool the battery to ambient temperature before charging.
- 9. Never exceed the battery manufacturers recommended maximum charge rate.
- 10. If your battery is involved in a crash, isolate the battery and observe it for at least 20 minutes. Damaged batteries can short internally and not necessarily immediately.
- 11. Have a fire extinguisher available for immediate use in case of a fire. (VB) there is a fire extinguisher near the frequency board 12. If a battery is damaged either physically or as the result of overcharging, DO NOT USE THE BATTERY.

Dispose of damaged Lithium batteries per the manufacturer's instructions.






Barnyard Buzzard's Club Meeting

Barnyard Buzzards Pilot Training



Use of a computer simulator is advisable. This allows you to practice safely and will end up saving you hundreds of dollars in the long run.

Still, in any case, the best way to learn to fly R/C planes is by finding an instructor to help. Learning on your own can be expensive and somewhat less safe.

We provide instruction for both building model aircraft as well as flying these models. In most cases, a buddy box system is used at the flying field. Experience has shown this to be the safest method to learn.


