It had started out as a warm and beautiful day for flying, but now a nagging breeze had picked up and the clouds were gathering to the west. Yeah, it was windy, but not enough to stop our hero Bubba from going up for one last flight before the rain moved in. After the usual routine of flawless loops and rolls and knife-edge passes, ol' Bubba smoothed it in on a short final and plunked it down on the sod with a perfect three-pointer. But suddenly, to everyone's surprise, a strong gust from the left picked up one wing and cartwheeled Bubba's favorite toy onto its back. No points for that landing! Fortunately, there was no damage, and nothing fell off, so Bubba righted the plane and rushed for cover as the first raindrops started to fall.

The next day, Bubba was out flying again, this time with clear skies and no wind to speak of. During one of his famous giant loops, right before everyone's eyes, there was a loud SNAP, as the wings clapped together and Bubba's plane came streaking down and buried itself in the hard ground. "Wha' happ'nd??", he shouted. "That plane could handle anything!"


While the above story is fiction, I'm sure most of us have heard of such an unfortunate event, or seen one first hand. Knowing what happened on the last flight before this ill-fated one, we can all arrive at the same conclusion—what would normally be a perfectly safe maneuver to perform, a gentle loop, and with a strong and reliable model, was now the catalyst for catastrophic failure. The difference this time was that the airframe had been compromised due to that cartwheel landing, and though the pilot was skilled and seasoned and familiar with what his plane could handle, there was obviously an insidious and undetected flaw in the wing that led to premature failure.


It's not hard to see how this kind of complacen-

cy can happen. There was no visible damage to the airplane, and it was slowing down on rollout when it flipped over, and made no loud cracking sound, so it is easy to assume that there were no consequences. But had the pilot taken the time that evening to thoroughly inspect the airframe, even going to the extent of supporting the wing between a table and a chair and pressing down on the center section, the weakened spar may have revealed itself. I know a guy who ignored his rattley engine noise, until one day the entire engine and firewall shot off the front of his plane! I've seen tail feathers fly off of planes whose owners stubbornly dismissed the telltale sound of flutter. Loose hatches and canopies, wobbly landing gear, even control surfaces that are so slackened they can't find center, are all signs that a thorough inspection is in order.

Take a minute now and then to give your stuff a thorough once-over, so you don't end up taking the walk of shame, like our friend Bubba!






25600 Monroe Camp Road, Snohomish, WA

Camp Edward and the Hanner's Memorial Field are located north of Monroe, Washington in Snohomish County. The most common route is from Highway 2 in Monroe near Albertson's. Turn north onto Woods Creek Road. As you travel north on Woods Creek road, it will come to a Y intersection, stay to the right (Yeager Rd).

*** If you go the the left as shown by MapQuest, make sure you take the next right to stay on Woods Creek Road. Then stay to the left at the intersection where Yeager rejoins Woods Creek Road, be careful as oncoming traffic does not stop ***

Yeager will rejoin Woods Creek Road at a 4-way intersection. Stay straight-ish, not a hard right, be careful as oncoming traffic does not stop. In a few miles you will pass the entrance to Camp Pigott. Keep going.

Turn right at the "T" intersection with Lake Roesiger Road. At the next "Y" intersection, stay right, onto South Lake Roesiger Road. Turn right at Monroe Camp Road, (Lake Roesinger Store will be on the left). In about a mile, the road will fork again, stay straight. After a short distance you will see the Red Barn and our gate. Our parking is past the gate on the East side of the barn.Alfy's Pizza (our monthly meeting place) is along RT2 in the Staples plaza.


