
An underlayment field requires patching when damaged and occasionally pulling the underlayment up for maintenance to care for ruts and critter tunnels/mounds.

By now we should have completed the new aero machines for the Annual Builder's Competition. The Building contest, in my way of thinking, is the beginning of a new season of fun and games at the field, Fun Flys, Combat events and the normal sport flying, just being with our fellow fliers. Even if some of them don't have the same views as to what the best radio or power source to propel the plane are.

Last year, we didn't have such a great year as far as safety is concerned

- An airplane chased a member down and chewed on his ankle
- Another tried to adjust the needle valve by sticking his hand through the prop
- There were a couple of other minor incidents that were patched up at home.

The last sentence in the intent of the Safety Rules is "<u>Common Sense</u> and courtesy shall prevail at all times".

So what is Common Sense? My dictionary defines common sense as sound practical judgment that is independent of specialized knowledge, training, or the like; normal native intelligence.

Is it common sense not to put a finger into a spinning prop; or is it some of the specialized knowledge that Mr. Webster is referring to?

We are now flying at the new field on days when we don't have work parties. When you are out at the field, it is really important to use common sense. At this time, the runway is a little hard to discern from the taxiway and pit area. If you are out with group of fliers, use common sense and use great communication by letting everyone know what you are doing... and don't stand in the area that is being used as the runway!

The runway is parallel with the north field fence and is about 50 feet wide starting at the edge of the grass that is also parallel with the north fence. The pilot station when installed will be about 10 feet from the south edge of the runway. At this time only the east 200 feet of runway is large-rock free, sort of.

Rule 9. "*Pilots shall not stand on the runway while flying.*" Common sense tells us that it is much easier to hit a target the closer you are to it, or is that another bit of knowledge we learned in our childhood. So by standing on the runway it should be easier to hit the runway and not land in the tall grass. This is where the sound practical judgment comes into play. We don't stand on the runway; we stand on one of the designated pilot stations (by the way there are a few pilots that think this rule does not apply to them).


What I'm saying is 99% of what we call common sense is something we have actually learned by education or experience, the Safety rules are just what the old timers have learned though experience and education and make sense. That's why we don't have a rule stating to land you have to stand on one foot and sing Row-Row-Your-Boat.

Fly safe, have fun!

The best Safety Rule to follow is use COM-MON SENSE and COURTESY while Flying at the new field. Think about it, that might just be the best Safety Rule always.

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

Use of a computer simulator is advisable. This allows you to practice safely and will end up saving you hundreds of dollars in the long run.

Still, in any case, the best way to learn to fly R/C planes is by finding an instructor to help. Learning on your own can be expensive and somewhat less safe.

We provide instruction for both building model aircraft as well as flying these models. In most cases, a buddy box system is used at the flying field. Experience has shown this to be the safest method to learn.
