

Safety Officer - Vince Bell had a few items to bring to the table this month.

First.) Brian had a plane fall out of the air mere feet after a hand launch and the LiPo battery burst into flames before anybody could disconnect it from the ESC. Lost were one airplane, one ESC and one LiPo battery. It was just a shame it did not happen in a controlled manner a few weeks earlier at the club meeting when this was supposed to have been demonstrated.

Second.) Ron R. found the gate post to our field the hard way. He flew into the post with his

Gremlin. He probably could not have more perfectly hit the center line of the post/sign if he were right in front of it trying to hit the center.

Third and last.) Another member was lucky to have only lost a counter top and sustain smoke damage when a LiPo battery he was charging on a counter in his kitchen caught fire. Overall estimate for repairs of the damage was said to be in the range of \$10,000.

Lessons to be learned from all of this:

Use a spotter while flying so there are twice as many people watching to make sure your plane is going where you think it is.

Carefully inspect your plane before flight for any telltale signs of issues. A glitch or issue on the ground is not going to get any better in the air.

Never charge your batteries unattended and always use some sort of fire barrier while charging, whether it be a charging sleeve, ammo can or ceramic pot.

A wattmeter is invaluable for our electric planes. Taking a measurement prior to your plane's maiden flight and anytime a change is made can help prevent a catastrophe.

Field Manager - Jay Bell stated that the belt on the lawnmower was recently replaced. It is in great shape as is the field.

Safety Corner

It is that time of year when the weather is getting a little warmer - not hot by any means. With a little bit of caution there is not too much chance of sun stroke or frost bite. What can get us in trouble is the life blood of our hobby, No, not the fuel, but the batteries. I hear all the time "I've used these batteries for 27 seasons and they are just fine!" Well they may not be just fine for the 28th season. With all the neat stuff we have available for testing the condition of the batteries there is no excuse not to test the batteries and determine what life is left in them. I personally discard battery packs when they get down to about 75% of their new life. The new capacity is not necessarily the number that is stamped on the label. Remember the manufacturer of the battery rates their battery at much lower current drain than we typically use them, hence there may be a delta right from the get go. Keeping good records will go a long way to not getting to the field with dead batteries. The worst thing is they are usually all right for the first or second flight and give out next flight. You can guess what happens when the batteries give out.

Let's all make the commitment to check our batteries, and be a little safer. Don't forget the transmitter battery. While in the aircraft check the condition of the wiring. We don't want to use wiring that the insulation is in bad shape or connectors that are loose and worn.

The other thing I hear a lot is "this is a new battery just bought it the other day". The NiMH Battery that you bought new the other day may not have the capability to be charged to anywhere near the rating stamped on it for the first or the first

several charge/discharge cycles when new. The manufacturer of the cells typically leaves out the last step in the manufacturing process of NiMH cells - that of forming the cell before shipping.

The included picture is the result when a NEW five cell battery that has not been formed and hence was not capable of getting a full charge or anywhere near full charge (of course it may have been a bad battery). In this case the battery was found to be too low for the taxi event of our Fun Fly contest. The battery was put on a charger at the field and the contestant was moved to the tail end of the roster. He was then able to complete the taxi event. When the field was open for flying after the contest, the owner took off and was having trouble controlling the aircraft. The aircraft did what aircraft do - it crashed straight into the ground and you can see the results. Post mortem - the Battery was dead! The moral of this story is, always know the condition of your batteries and don't trust a new or old battery until vou have tested it and know what its actual capacity is.











Barnyard Buzzard's Club Meeting

Barnyard Buzzards Pilot Training



Use of a computer simulator is advisable. This allows you to practice safely and will end up saving you hundreds of dollars in the long run.

Still, in any case, the best way to learn to fly R/C planes is by finding an instructor to help. Learning on your own can be expensive and somewhat less safe

We provide instruction for both building model aircraft as well as flying these models. In most cases, a buddy box system is used at the flying field. Experience has shown this to be the safest method to learn.
