Field, AMA, and FAA Safety Rules: Mark talked with Tony Stillman (Head Safety Guy) at the AMA. We need to adhere to the AMA guidelines on the safety rules. UAV Operation Rules 550 is for FPV (First Person View) – This only applies when the pilot is wearing FPV goggles. Having a camera or screen does not or is not considered FPV as you can look up and see the UAV. When operating FPV you should have a spotter, and you must maintain your visual line of sight during the flight. If there is an aircraft operating in the area, you need the spotter to warn you of this aircraft. Visual Line sight is dependent on the user, and there is a little bit of grey area. If you put a strobe light on, this does increase the overall visual line of sight. It's suggested to put such a light on your FPV Quad. Even having a Part 107 license would not prevent you from flying out of line of sight. We should not take off from the parking lot, street, or behind the flight line at any time. When we do have events, and we are taking photos of the event you need to get a unanimous approval from all the people who would be affected to overfly that event.

Buddy Box Question (Point of Information) - A question was asked about guests at the field,

they must be on a "Buddy Box" when flying until they have been approved to solo.

With your help as a donor and auction winner, the purpose of the auction is fulfilled. And so we need your help.



Do any of my fellow Buzzards enjoy "Air Disasters" on the Smithsonian channel, or any other shows like it? Basically it's an aviation version of forensic files where teams of experts analyze accidents to help improve overall aviation safety.

Determining what went wrong after a model aircraft crash can be equally important, helpful and interesting. We model pilots can be quick to make excuses or give a quick vague explanation after a crash such as "I lost signal" "It stopped responding (to one or all inputs)" "It was the wind" Or even just "I lost it". But determining why you "lost signal" or "lost it" can help you avoid similar incidents in the future.

One plane I helped recover last year had suddenly nose dived into the ground at high speed. When I found the wreckage that lawn darted into the swamp, I immediately noticed the linkage from the elevator was not connected to the servo. It was a metal servo arm and the linkage had come unscrewed from the arm. The plane had been recently repaired from a previous incident and the linkage was inadvertently left loose. Many crashes won't be so obvious but if you suspect you lost signal, if possible test all radio functions as soon as the wreckage is found. Look over the crash carefully for any clues that might help explain what went wrong.

If a crash helps you learn and be a safer, better pilot/modeler in the future, then it has served a purpose. We have all heard the old saying, you learn more from your failures than you do from your successes. ... It might be

true! Hopefully no one was hurt and the model is repairable. Safety includes our models, too!

From Lee Atchison Thought Leader, Cloud Expert, Application Modernization Keeping your plane at least "two mistakes" high means staying high enough so that you can recover from two mistakes made at the same time. Imagine you're flying your plane and you make a mistake—you lose altitude. While you are trying to recover from the mistake, you have to do a number of tricky maneuvers, such as trying to level the plane out, slow it down, and turn it into the wind. These are critical tasks you need to perform to save your plane. What happens if you make a mistake while performing these tasks? You need to make sure you are still high enough so that this second mistake doesn't result in a crash.

Camp Edward and the Hanner's Memorial Field are located north of Monroe, Washington in Snohomish County. The most common route is from Highway 2 in Monroe near Albertson's. Turn north onto Woods Creek Road. As you travel north on Woods Creek Road, it will come to a Y intersection, stay to the right (Yeager Rd).

If you go the left as shown by MapQuest, make sure you take the <u>next right</u> to stay on Woods Creek Road. Then stay to the <u>left</u> at the intersection where Yeager rejoins Woods Creek Road, <u>be careful as on-</u> <u>coming traffic does not stop.</u>

Yeager will rejoin Woods Creek Road at a 4-way intersection. Stay straight-ish, not a hard right, <u>be careful as oncoming traffic does not</u> <u>stop</u>. In a few miles you will pass the entrance to Camp Pigott. Keep going. Turn right at the "T" intersection at Lake Roesiger Road. At the next "Y" intersection, stay right, staying on South Lake Roesiger Road. Turn right at Monroe Camp Road, (Lake Roesiger Store will be on the left). In about a mile, the road will fork again, stay straight. After a short distance you will see our club sign and our gate. Our parking is past the gate on the right. It seems complicated, but once you come out, you'll see it is an easy drive....


