Secretary Vaughan mentioned the July meeting minutes and solicited any questions, concerns, or comments. A motion was made to approve the July meeting minutes as published The motion was seconded, voted on and approved.

Officers' Reports

Secretary –Vaughan Houger reported 58 members are in the club.

Vice President – Jim Reynolds mentioned that the upcoming open house and swap meet was moved from Sunday to Saturday, August 13th due to the no-fly rule imposed for Sundays. Additionally, the September Combat event was moved to Saturday, September 10th.

Treasurer – Rick Hanners reported that financially we're in good shape. He mentioned that the money raised from the charity auction was going to be presented to the Monroe food bank.

Safety Officer – Vince Bell along with help from Chet explained a recent incident. A couple of Saturdays ago, Chet was taxiing his plane back to the pit area. As he was reaching for the plane he accidently shut the transmitter off; the plane's receiver was still on. This resulted in the receiver going into "fail safe" mode, which returned the throttle servo to the setting established for sustained flight until the transmitter can be turned on again. Only, this time the plane was on the ground and pointed towards Chet. Chet tried to divert the plane with one foot, but the spinning prop managed to connect with his other foot. Long story short, the damage to Chet's ankle resulted in about 13 stitches. So, take heed when managing your plane and ensure the engine is off prior to switching off your transmitter.

Vince reflected on the numbers of planes that

Newsletter editor / Webmaster– Ron Swift reported on the recent Fun Fly event and had plaques to present to team winners. Ron stated that the Fun Fly was fun, safe, and exciting.

Announcements

Vince complemented Al Morse on achieving his solo status. Vince presented a solo achievement plaque to Al, which resulted in a round of applause from the club members.

President Bryan Reightley reminded everyone, again, about the no-fly zone over the house; and that Sundays are permanently unavailable for flying.

Bryan also has been adding a second lock to the gate on Saturday evenings to ensure no one flies on Sunday. He was wondering when the requirement for needing a second lock is no longer necessary. Apparently, not everyone is reading email messages, or the on-line version of the newsletter. So, plans are in place to snail mail information regarding the field situation to all members.

Old Business

Bryan then called for old business: <u>Visitors and neighbors</u>: Continue to be mindful and courteous to our visitors and neighbors.

New Business

<u>Status of our current flying field:</u> President Bryan Reightley described our current situation and the changes Dale made to the terms and conditions of our rental agreement.

1. No flying on Sundays period.

2. Only quiet electric powered aircraft allowed starting November 1st.

No guarantee of any flying after July 1st, 2012. Bryan, then, presented to the club its choices. Address Dale's proposed terms and conditions changes: After an engaging discussion, which addressed the pros and cons of the situation, a couple of motions were presented.


- The first motion was to empower the BBMAC board to decisively act on an opportunity to secure a new field site should one be made available. The board would act in good faith and use good judgment in making this potential decision. The motion was seconded, voted on, and unanimously passed.
- The second motion addressed Dale's proposed revisions. This motion was to serve Dale with a 90 day notice whereby the Barnyard Buzzards would cease operations on his property effective November 30, 2011. Pros and cons were discussed if the Buzzards were to proceed with this action. Subsequently, the motion was seconded, voted on and passed with one opposed. The opposing argument pertained to the cohesiveness of the club members; if we were to cease operations without securing another field the risk of losing members increases.

Following these motions, President Bryan Reightley explained that going forward we do so as a unified club, that this is a total club effort. Now that a decision has been made the level of urgency to find at least a temporary field along with a permanent field is intensified. Every member is to be on the lookout. Bryan stated he would draft the club's decision to leave in a letter to Dale.

The club will construct a brochure to describe the layout of the field, what our minimum requirements are for safe operation, and the general culture of the club. The requirements are as follows:

1. Some fencing, to separate the runway from the pilots' work benches.

2. The club is responsible for maintaining the *(Continued on page 4)*

site including mowing and general upkeep.

 The club's current land footprint is 2 acres for tables, parking, port-a-potties, shed, staging, and runway. All of these items are necessary for functional operation. The recommended area for flying is 8 to 10 acres.
The club recommends the track of land considered for occupancy be a safe reasonable distance from roads, obstructing objects, and building developments.

Benefits:

1. We are a chartered member of the Academy of Model Aeronautics (AMA) club number 2953. This membership includes liability insurance for the landowner. Additionally, we do monitor our aircraft noise levels to comply with the AMA's recommended noise guide-

lines.

2. We do offer guaranteed rent to be negotiated with the landowner.

3. The club is regularly engaged in community service events, cub and boy scouts, food bank, organized municipal festivals, fairs, etc.

The meeting adjourned at around 7:50 P.M. The next meeting is Tuesday, September 13, 2011, at our flying field in Monroe at 6:30 P.M.


Index Arts Festival



All seems to be going well at the field, no serious injuries that I have heard about.

Isn't there a saying about doing something in tall cotton, I wonder if it applies to tall corn?

Here are a couple things to think about.

A model, engine, or radio that is not prepared and working properly on the ground before takeoff will not improve in the air - IT WILL GET WORSE! There is no point in attempting to fly until everything is 100% correct. (Sig Mfg. Co., Inc.)


The other half of the flying experience equation is the pilot. Substitute pilot for "model, engine or radio" into the above, you get the point, I hope.

Safety is a state of mind, Think about what you are doing and the consequences if you don't. Think first then act. Engage mind before muscle.

Safety First Fact: Bureau of Labor Statistics data on occupational injuries and illnesses show that, in 2002:

- There were 42,286 occupational injuries or illnesses involving the eye that resulted in days away from work. The typical eye injuries occurred by rubbed or abraded foreign matter, such as metal chips, dirt particles and splinters, or by striking the eye. Surface wounds, such as abrasions, scratches and foreign bodies (splinters and chips) were among the most common types of injuries to the eyes.
- Eye injuries accounted for 47 percent of all head injuries involving days away from work and 70 percent of all face injuries involving days away from work. Workers in the manufacturing and trade industries and those in the occupational groups of operators, fabricators and laborers and in precision, production, craft and repair occupations were most at risk of incurring an eye injury.

Stay safe on the job. Follow all safety policies and procedures, wear your personal protective equipment where and when required, report safety hazards and incidents immediately, and offer suggestions to improve on the job safety. Remember if you can't go to work because of an eye injury you won't be able to fly, maybe not even build. I have seen some planes that look like they were built by Braille.







From our July meeting minutes posted in the August newsletter:

Barnyard Buzzards Pilot Training

Our club is dedicated to the safe pursuit and advancement of model aviation. We offer the newcomer free lessons to learn how to build models and to fly them. If you should have any questions about the club, flight instruction or membership requirements, call any of the club officers. We have a safety checklist available for those new to our flying field.

Use of a computer simulator is advisable. This allows you to practice safely and will end up saving you hundreds of dollars in the long run.

Still, in any case, the best way to learn to fly R/C planes is by finding an instructor to help. Learning on your own can be expensive and somewhat less safe.

We provide instruction for both building model aircraft as well as flying these models. In most cases, a buddy box system is used at the flying field. Experience has shown this to be the safest method to learn.

Then, a **Show & Tell** and **raffle** conclude the meeting, which ends at around 8:30 P.M.


